

KISKAM PROJECT STAKEHOLDERS' FORUM

Held at the Jiweke Tavern 8th November, 2021



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Report by: The Natural Capital Trust 2021

A joint consultative forum organized by Natural Capital Trust (NCT) and the Hungarian Charity Service of the Order of Malta (HCSOM) with the support of grassroots community leaders and representatives from Kibera Sub County, Nairobi County, Kenya.

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This event convened a consultative forum organized by the Natural Capital Trust (NCT) in collaboration with the Hungarian Charity Service of the Order of Malta (HCSOM), bringing together various groups and community leaders from Kibera sub-county, Nairobi, Kenya. Representatives were drawn from youth groups, women groups, religious institutions, and village elders in Kibera. The primary objective of the forum was to explore ways to empower residents of Kibera, the largest slum in Kenya, to achieve better and sustainable livelihoods. Participants engaged in discussions and sought solutions to several key issues:

- Identifying challenges faced by residents of slum areas in Kenya.
- Proposing solutions to address these challenges.
- Exploring the potential of urban-rural migration as a solution.
- Considering potential partnerships with community organizations and Kibera residents to address issues facing slum residents in Kenya.

Ninety-six individuals, representing different groups from Kibera, attended the forum. Plenary sessions and group discussions were conducted, with participants grouped to deliberate on specific areas of interest. The discussions were dynamic and yielded insightful outcomes. Key points emerging from the forum include:

- Urban residents face more challenges compared to their rural counterparts.
- Many slum residents have no alternative but to live in urban areas due to lack of land, housing, and resources in rural areas.
- Repatriation must be demand-driven, initiated by the urban slum dwellers.
- Conducting surveys is essential to identify needs before repatriation initiatives.
- Repatriation should be a gradual process, involving training and preparation of both individuals and their families in the village.

Vulnerable persons in Kibera should be prioritized as potential beneficiaries based on their needs.

Age considerations are crucial when selecting candidates for repatriation.

This forum provided valuable insights and recommendations for empowering residents of Kibera and addressing challenges faced by slum dwellers in Kenya.

INTRODUCTION

KISKAM Project

Drawing on our extensive experience working in urban informal settlements and with a concerted effort to break the cycle of poverty in urban slums, NCT, in collaboration with the Hungarian Charity Service of the Order of Malta (HCSOM), has developed an intervention known as the KISKAM Project. This initiative aims to empower communities in urban slums to settle sustainably in their rural homes. The KISKAM Project is voluntary and demand-based, focusing on building the capacity of urban slum dwellers who are willing to relocate to their rural homes in a sustainable manner.

Initially, the project will involve a pilot phase with 50 beneficiary households selected from six villages in Kibra, who will be resettled in Siaya and Kakamega over a period of 2 years.



To implement this project, NCT has appointed a team of five Field Officers residing in Kibra to assist with community mobilization. Information about the project has been shared with local authorities, including the Deputy County Commissioner (DCC) of Kibra, principal chiefs, senior chiefs, and assistant chiefs in the respective villages. Planned activities include beneficiary identification, training, facilitation of settlement, and support for income-generating activities. The selection of destination counties was influenced by various factors, including the origin of communities with the highest population in Kibra and residents from villages most affected by poverty in Kibra, with preliminary investigations indicating that the highest number of

individuals in needy areas of Kibra originate from Western and Nyanza regions, hence the selection of Siaya and Kakamega Counties.

To solidify this initiative, NCT organized a Stakeholder Consultative Forum on December 8th, 2021. This forum brought together community members from the six villages of Kibra targeted for the KISKAM project. The consultation provided an opportunity for community members and stakeholders to participate in the conceptualization of the project, ensuring its effectiveness in positively impacting the community. Additionally, community representatives were elected during the forum to collaborate with NCT in confirming the participation of volunteers in the project. Representatives from various groups, including youth groups, women groups, village elders, religious institutions, and academic institutions, were present from each of the six villages.



OBJECTIVES OF THE STAKEHOLSDERS' FORUM

The following were the main objectives of the KISKAM Project Stakeholders' forum:

- 1. To discuss and identify challenges facing residents of slum areas in Kenya.
- 2. To discuss and identify possible solutions to the challenges facing residents of slum areas in Kenya.
- 3. To investigate the potential of urban-rural migration being a solution to challenges facing residents of slum areas in Kenya.
- 4. To explore whether partnerships between community organizations and residents of urban slums could bring forward solutions to problems facing residents of urban slums in Kenya.

Opening Remarks

The meeting commenced with a prayer offered by one of the participants. In his opening remarks, Mr. Anthony Wachira welcomed all participants and outlined the agenda for the day. He provided clear and concise timelines for the forum, which was scheduled to run from the opening until 2 pm. Mr. Wachira emphasized the importance of collective action in addressing life challenges and reminded attendees to adhere to government regulations aimed at curbing the spread of COVID-19. He facilitated an introduction session, where attendees were introduced, with those from Kibera introduced according to the villages they represented.

Dr. Janet Mangera, the Executive Director of NCT, delivered the keynote address. She introduced the Natural Capital Trust (NCT) and its theory of change: Transform, Restore, and Sustain. Through a PowerPoint presentation, she informed attendees about NCT's work in improving livelihoods through projects focusing on Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (WASH), gender and youth empowerment, as well as slum-life improvement. Dr. Mangera also introduced the Hungarian Charity Service of the Order of Malta (HCSOM), which collaborates with NCT in its initiatives in Kenya. Ms. Rachel Czirjak represented HCSOM at the forum. Dr. Mangera highlighted some of the projects undertaken by NCT and HCSOM, including the Jollyland Water, Hygiene, and Sanitation Project in Kibera. Additionally, she introduced NCT staff members: Mr. Brian Simiyu (Project Officer), Ms. Veronica Kalekye (Administrative Assistant), Nicholas Kimilu (Intern), and the five field officers: Mr. Christopher Otieno, Ms. Faith Ondieki, Mr. Richard Ogutu, Ms. Stella Nabwire, and Mr. Ken Omoto.

Dr. Mangera reiterated NCT's and HCSOM's commitment to working with vulnerable populations to transform their situations. She emphasized that the project was purely developmental and impartial, despite the politically charged environment in the country leading up to the 2022 elections. Dr. Mangera informed the forum that although chiefs were expected to participate, it was decided not to involve them due to the political climate. However, she assured participants that the local administration was aware of and supportive of the project.

Ms. Rachel Czirjak expressed gratitude to NCT and the residents of Kibera for organizing the Consultative Forum. She stressed the importance of community initiatives in improving the livelihoods of slum residents and assured HCSOM's support for charitable endeavors.

Dr. Mangera also introduced some partners who NCT and HCSOM have collaborated with in Kibera, including Ms. Zuhura Suleiman. Ms. Zuhura thanked NCT for the opportunity to participate in the meeting and encouraged cooperation among participants for the success of the venture.

Mr. Said Lugo Mwachiti, an administrator of the Laini Saba division in Kibera, represented the District Commissioner of Kibera at the forum. He conveyed regards from the District Commissioner, who was unable to attend. Mr. Mwachiti highlighted the importance of parenting in addressing vices such as drug and substance abuse in slum areas. He encouraged communal child-rearing, emphasizing the accountability of every adult for every child in the community. Mr. Mwachiti endorsed the KISKAM project as an innovative idea and requested the sharing of community representatives' names with the DCC office.

ICE-Breaker An ice-breaking session led by Brian Simiyu involved participants following instructions given by the facilitator using pieces of paper. The activity aimed to gauge participants' attentiveness by observing their paper patterns mirroring the facilitator's actions.



BREAK-OUT GROUP DISCUSSIONS

In line with the consultative nature of the forum, participants were organized into groups to facilitate structured discussions. The formation of these groups aimed to address the meeting objectives methodically. Each group was assigned a specific question corresponding to an agenda item. Participants deliberated on their respective questions and presented their findings, subject to approval by all members. At the conclusion of the session, the following insights emerged from the five groups:

Discussion Questions

- Group 1: Reasons for Rural-Urban Migration in Kenya
- Group 2: Major Challenges Faced by Residents of Informal Settlements in Kenya
- Group 3: Potential Solutions to Problems Faced by Residents of Informal Settlements in Kenya
- Group 4: Factors Motivating Relocation from Urban to Rural Areas

Findings from Group Discussions

Group 1: Reasons for Rural-Urban Migration

- Employment opportunities, which are limited in rural areas
- Pursuit of education, particularly higher education available in urban centers
- Seeking refuge from conflicts and family disputes in rural areas
- Lack of adequate land for settlement in rural regions
- Desire for exploration and adventure
- Perception of urban life being safer and more comfortable
- Influence from peers who have already migrated to urban areas
- Seeking refuge after involvement in criminal activities in rural areas
- Superstitions regarding safety and well-being in rural settings after specific cultural events

Group 2: Challenges Facing Residents of Informal Settlements

- Frequent water shortages
- Inadequate sanitation facilities
- Poor infrastructure, including roads
- High levels of insecurity
- Drug and substance abuse
- Unemployment
- Poverty and food insecurity
- Inefficient waste management leading to health hazards
- Insufficient educational facilities
- Overcrowding and lack of privacy
- Early pregnancies among school-going children
- Limited access to healthcare services
- High prevalence of HIV/AIDS
- Single parenthood and dependence
- Political tensions resulting in conflicts
- Gender-based violence and child trafficking
- Prostitution and child labor
- Rent inflation in informal settlements

Group 3: Solutions to Problems Facing Residents of Urban Slums

- Regulation of water vendors and prices
- Curbing corruption in water supply systems Borehole drilling to address water scarcity
- Awareness campaigns on water purification
- Infrastructure upgrades to reduce congestion
- Financial literacy programs
- Youth engagement initiatives to enhance security
- Government intervention to control school fees
- Improvement of drainage systems
- Provision of waste disposal containers and recycling programs
- Awareness on relocation from flood-prone areas
- Crackdown on illegal electricity connections
- Expansion of social amenities
- Eradication of medicine misappropriation and illegal healthcare facilities
- Promotion of family values and gender equality

- Investment opportunities
- Support networks for relocation

Group 5: Considerations for Relocation Candidates

- Vulnerability assessment, including mental health
- Provision of land, housing, and business opportunities
- Capacity-building training
- Financial support for children's education
- Confirmation of genuine interest in relocation
- Evaluation of comfort level in rural settings Diversification of income sources
- Collaboration with religious institutions
- Age considerations and support systems

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Emerging Issues

Urban challenges outweigh rural difficulties

- Limited options force residents to stay in slums
- Demand-driven approach for relocation
- Importance of thorough surveys before repatriation
- Gradual and prepared repatriation process
- Focus on vulnerable populations and age-related factors

Election of Community Representatives for the KISKAM Project

Following the productive group discussions, participants were tasked with electing community representatives. In addition to members elected from each group, special interest groups, including religious institutions and people with disabilities, nominated three additional representatives. These elected individuals will serve as liaisons between NCT and the Kibera community. The following persons were chosen to represent their respective groups:

Sub-meeting of elected community representatives

Upon being elected to the Community Representatives Committee, the members convened for another session with NCT leadership, which took place concurrently with the consultative forum. Dr. Janet Mangera, addressing the members, outlined their primary responsibility: to verify information provided to NCT by potential beneficiaries of the repatriation project. Stressing the importance of honesty in their interactions, she urged the representatives to gather accurate data from potential beneficiaries. Additionally, the facilitator of the forum emphasized the critical role of community representatives in disseminating precise information about the program to Kibera residents. Mr. Brian Simiyu, the Project Officer, emphasized the significance of teamwork to ensure smooth operations and efficient delivery. He assured members that they would receive communication via phone calls on the following day regarding their duties as community representatives.

Conclusion

Dr. Janet Mangera reiterated that the project is community-based and devoid of any political affiliations. Its aim is to assist all vulnerable and needy residents of Kibera, irrespective of their political leanings or tribal affiliations. Mr. Wachira, the forum facilitator, officially concluded the session at 2 pm on the same day.
